Know Your Customer and Multiple Thanks

s you may know, SSPC just had a very successful international conference in Las Vegas. I will talk about that later in this editorial, but first I want to relay an interesting message I heard from one of the attendees.

After I returned to Pittsburgh, I was talking to one of our members about the conference and her experiences at the event. She is an engineer at a major U.S. shipyard who exerts a lot of influence on the operations there. She mentioned that as she and her husband walked through the exhibit hall, she was amazed by how she was received by the exhibitors. To further explain, her husband used to work at the same shipyard. He is retired and is no longer in a position to influence any purchases initiated by that

SSPC Board Announces College Scholarship Program

SPC recently announced that the Board of Governors approved two \$2,500 scholarships for college students for the upcoming 2011-2012 school year.

Any student pursuing an education in the coatings field can apply for the scholarship. Certain educational institutions in the U.S. feature coatings-related programs, and the Board has targeted these schools for using the scholarship. They include Eastern Michigan University; Illinois Institute of Technology; North Dakota State University; Ohio State University; University of Akron; University of Hawaii; University of Missouri, Rolla; University of Southern Mississippi; University of Virginia; and Williamson Free School of Mechanical Trades.

To be considered for the scholarship, candidates must be a high school senior planning to enroll full-time or a student already enrolled full-time at an accredited institution of higher learning that has a three- or four-year curriculum. The program of choice must deal with coatings. Candidates must submit a completed application form, two letters of recommendation from two different

people unrelated to the applicant, high school or college transcripts, and a personal letter expressing why they deserve the scholarship and what they plan to do in the coatings field.

A panel of three SSPC members designated by the Board will choose the scholarship recipient.

SSPC President Russ Brown said, "The coatings industry is going through a fundamental transformation right now. As the elder statesmen wind down their careers, we need to fill that gap with the next generation of chemists,

engineers, and business owners. SSPC feels a responsibility to do that, and this scholarship is an important step."

Scholarship funds will be applied to the direct costs of education courses, approved in advance and related to the field of coatings. The direct costs include the cost of the individual's course of study.

On Cleanliness of Steel Abrasive in the Shop

What quality control checks can I use to assure the cleanliness of steel abrasive in a fabricator's or shipyard's shop?

Cleanliness of recycled steel abrasive in the work mix depends on whether the shop uses an airwash separation system. The system, which is paramount to the blasting operation, must be set correctly to remove all contamination from the blasting mix but also leave the clean, useful abrasive in the system.

A screen analysis is also a good pro-

cedure for seeing if the mix contains dust or other contamination. Depending on the size, contamination will usually be found from the 50-mesh size down to and including the pan. If this is the case, more airflow might be required at the separator to remove the unwanted and potentially damaging waste.

"Cleanliness of Recycled Ferrous

Size and mix can be checked with about 2-3 different mesh size strainers.

Sharpness or roundness can be checked visually by comparing the used abrasive with new steel abrasive.

Check for contamination with oil and grease by first putting some grit in a glass of warm water; then look for oil floating.

Salt contamination can be checked by putting some grit in a glass of water and running a conductivity test.



The Case of the Balking Bulkhead

oating specifiers, contractors, or manufacturers are often blamed when installed coatings fail to meet service life expectations. This month's Case from the F-Files describes the rapid deterioration and failure of a sheet pile coating system because of errors from both the applicator and the facility owner.

Facility Description

The project involved the rehabilitation of approximately 9,000 linear feet of steel bulkhead along the south, west, and north shorelines of an east coast marine location. The bulkhead was immersed in a saltwater estuary. According to the facility owner, the sheet piles were in marine service for approximately 15 years before their original coating deteriorated severely and the piling needed to be recoated. The original date of installation and the identity of the pre-existing coating were unknown. The underlying steel surfaces were heavily corroded, with areas of d ense pitting, and had marine growth.

The Repainting Operation

According to the facility owner, a coating contractor was hired to clean and prepare the sheet pile surfaces and replace the 9,000 feet of existing coating with a self-priming coal tar epoxy (CTE) coating system. The project was to be carried out by cleaning a section of sheet pile that was exposed at low tide and re-coated within 24 hours with the replacement coating. In this manner, approximately 1,000 feet could be completed in a 48-hour interval. The surfaces to be coated were cleaned using ultra-high-pressure waterjetting (UHPWJ)

at 35,000 psi. The next day, just before coating, the surfaces were washed with pressurized water (2,000–3,000 psi) to remove flash rust. All work was performed at low tide.

The product data sheet (PDS) recommended a dry film thickness (DFT) range of 18 to 20 mils over a surface profile of 2 to 3 mils for immersion service. The CTE could be applied between tides and immersed 30 minutes after application. According to the PDS, at 59 F, the coating dries to the touch in 10

hours and will dry hard in 18 hours. The PDS also stated that the CTE could tolerate re-oxidized (flash-rusted) and damp surfaces. According to the facility owner, the surfaces of coated pile between the high and low tide levels began to lose coating within two days of application and continued to lose coating for the 30 days preceding the failure investigation.

Investigating the Failure

The field inspection involved approximately 3,000 feet of sheet pile on the north side of the marina. The inspection was made from a boat at low tide. The bulkheads were constructed from interlocking Z-sections of steel sheet piles that started at the pile cap and were driven into the bay bottom at the base of the sea wall. At low tide, approximately four feet of coated sheet pile was exposed. At the time of the site inspection, the replacement coating on the

first 3,000 feet of pile had been in place for approximately 30 days.

During the inspection, three distinct areas of sheet piling were visible. On the first 3,000-foot section, which represented the original deteriorated coating, a pre-existing black coating had areas of rusting and coating loss. Marine growth covered the pile surfaces.

The second 3,000-foot section had been cleaned using UHPWJ at 35,000 psi, but left uncoated. The coating operation had been suspended following delamination problems with earlier recoating work. The steel surfaces were clear of old coating and marine growth but had developed a continuous, adherent layer of flash rust.

The third 3,000-foot section had been recently cleaned with UHPWJ at 35,000 psi and recoated with the CTE down to the low tide waterline. This section displayed coating damage to the new CTE and was the subject of the field investigation. An electronic gage was used to measure the DFT of the applied CTE. The DFT for the intact coating ranged from 12.5 to 20.7 mils, with an average of 17.9 mils. Measured with a dial micrometer, the DFT of coating chips removed from the damaged areas ranged from 9.4 to 18.9 mils, with an average of 13.7 mils.

Random areas of coating damage extended from the low tide waterline upward to the high tide level, which was I foot below the top of the pile. The damage was more severe in the lower areas of the piles (with a longer period of immersion) than in the higher pile areas (with a shorter period of immersion). The damage consisted of large, dry blisters accompanied by coating delamination. The exposed metallic surface beneath the blisters was dry but rusted. It also contained whitish deposits.

Probing the damaged areas with the point of a knife blade confirmed that the coating at the perimeter of the damage was attached to the steel sheet pile. The intact areas were generally above the

splash zone.

After the field inspection, facility personnel revealed that an impressed current cathodic protection (CP) system had been installed eight years before the renovation work began. The CP remained energized during cleaning and recoating operations.

A laboratory investigation of failed coating chips removed from the re-coated pile revealed small pinholes that transmitted light. When examined under a 50x stereo microscope, the backsides of the coating chips were rough and contained islands of adherent rust and powdery white deposits. The deposits were moistened with distilled water and tested for pH. Multiple tests on the backside of several chips indicated a pH range of 8 to 10.

What Went Wrong?

The field inspection and laboratory analysis of the collected data pointed toward the following significant factors that caused the pile coating failures.

Inadequate Coating Thickness

The sheet piles were in marine service for approximately 15 years before recoating. The original pile coating had severely deteriorated, and the underlying steel surfaces were heavily corroded with areas of dense pitting. Under these conditions, it is quite probable that the profile of the cleaned steel was in excess of 3 mils. In fact, depth gage measure-

ments on the backsides of removed coating chips showed a range of 5 mils (on flat substrate) to 22 mils (over pits).

The DFT for the recently applied coating ranges from 12.5 mils to 20.7 mils, with an average of 17.9 mils. The DFT of coating chips removed from the damaged areas was measured with a dial micrometer and ranged from 9.4 to 18.9 mils, with an average of 13.7 mils. The average DFTs of the chips and the intact coating were below the minimum DFT recommended in the PDS. The low DFT and excessive surface profile resulted in coating pinholes that could have allowed sea water to penetrate the steelto-coating interface and affect adhesion while the coating was soft and not fully cured.

Effect of Cathodic Protection

During the field inspection, facility personnel revealed that an impressed current CP system had been installed for approximately eight years before recoating. CP imposes an electrical current that flows from a network of anodes to the steel surface of the sheet pile, which is the cathode and protected from corrosion. In theory, the level of impressed voltage needed to prevent corrosion of steel in sea water is -0.800 V measured against a silver/silver chloride (Ag/AgCl) electrode.

However, from a practical standpoint, CP specialists design circuits that operate over a range of -0.950 V to -1.000 V. The additional 0.150 V to 0.200 V represents the hydrogen overvoltage, or the region over which gaseous hydrogen is liberated off the protected steel surface. The reaction also forms hydroxyl (OH) ions that elevate the pH at the surface of the steel.

The OH⁻ ions subsequently react with bicarbonates in the seawater to produce insoluble calcareous deposits at the steel cathode. The chemical residues resulting from CP typically exhibit a pH above 7. The dry blisters and the

whitish calcareous deposits with a pH of 8 to 10 were results of the CP reactions. It appeared that the degree of coating disbondment was in proportion to the length of immersion during the tidal pattern.

Who Was to Blame for the Failure?

The contractor's failure to meet the minimum DFT recommended by the coating manufacturer was a factor leading to the coating failure. There was also a failure of communication between the owner and contractor regarding the presence of an energized CP system. In the event that neither party understood the effect of CP, the coating manufacturer should have been consulted.

Making Repairs

Before coating repairs began, the rectifier system was turned off. The damaged coating was then removed back to sound material using UHPWJ at 35,000 psi and then recoated with the specified



CTE. A minimum DFT of up to 30 mils, free of pinholes, was applied above the local surface profile of the metal to compensate for the roughened condition of the cleaned sheet pile.

Areas with adhered coating below the specified DFT received additional coating to build up the DFT to a minimum of 20 mils. The coating was given 10 days to fully cure before the rectifier system was turned back on. The same procedures were applied to the 6,000 feet of bulkhead yet to be fully renovated.

After two years, no coating failure has recurred. The anticipated life of the new CTE with CP is 10 to 15 years.

Fishing for the Best Abrasive

ack when I was a youthful dad, I took my two young daughters down to the creek behind our house to teach them how to fish. When we opened the tackle box, their jaws dropped as their eyes scanned the many lures neatly spread out on the bottom of the box. Big and small, hard and soft, some lures were heavy, to fish on the bottom, or light, to float on the surface. My girls asked, "Daddy, which one is the best?" With a wink, I said, "They are all the best! It just depends on what fish you're trying to catch, the day's conditions, and where you're going to fish."

If you asked me a similar question about picking the best abrasive product for a job, I would give a similar answer. "It depends." It all comes down to project parameters, surface conditions, and your expected outcome. Before selecting the "best" abrasive, you must answer several questions about the surface preparation project.

- · What is the current surface condition: adhering paint, a brittle coating that is peeling, or mill scale?
- · What are the goals and expectations after blasting? For example, is the surface being prepared for a new coating or cleaned to create a uniform visual finish that will be left uncoated?
- Will the surface profile need to meet the specification for the coating system or is it more important that the abrasive blast at fast cleaning rates?

Before selecting the best abrasive for a project, you must understand the characteristics of abrasives and how they affect the resulting finish. Like fishing lures, abrasives come in many sizes, hardnesses, shapes, and densities. Each abrasive's characteristics will affect the blast cleaning process and final results.

Particle Size

The size of the abrasive particles affects both the productivity and surface profile. Decreasing abrasive particle size can dramatically increase cleaning rate, with more particles impacting the surface per unit time when compared with the use of a coarser abrasive. However, increasing abrasive size may be necessary to remove heavy coatings and scale. The general rule is: "Use the smallest size abrasive particle that will do the job."

Coarse abrasives generally leave a deeper and less uniform profile than finer abrasives. If a low profile is required, choose a finer abrasive. Conversely, use a coarse abrasive for a

heavier profile. The normal tendency is to use a very coarse abrasive because it will knock off the paint, rust, scale, and other debris. But a coarse abrasive sacrifices coverage or cleaning rate. If a smaller abrasive will work just as well, use it because it will greatly increase cleaning rate.

Hardness

It is generally believed that the harder the abrasive is, the better it will perform. Very hard abrasives, however, tend to shatter on impact, expending most of the energy in particle disintegration and dust generation. A softer abrasive will transmit all of its energy to the surface, clean faster, and minimize dust. Similar to selecting abrasive size, select the minimum abrasive hardness that will effectively do the job. Hard abrasives will remove all coatings and surface contaminants and impart a profile on the surface. Very soft abrasives such as walnut shells and corn cobs are used to remove oil and grease and sometimes paint, leaving the exist-

ing substrate intact. In this case, the abrasive should break down on impact, carrying away the contaminants. If the intent is to remove only the coating and not disturb the substrate, use a slightly harder, friable abrasive such as soda ash, dry ice, or plastic pellets.

Shape

If the steel surface has a soft, pliable coating to be removed, an angular abrasive will be more productive than a rounded abrasive. Conversely, if the surface has a hard, brittle coating or mill scale, a rounded abrasive is preferred to pop off the coating or scale rather than pick away at it with a gritlike abrasive. An angular abrasive creates an angular and generally not very uniform surface profile. You will get a less angular but more peened surface if you use a rounded particle, such as steel shot or a heavy mineral sand (e.g., staurolite and olivine, which are naturally occurring and low in free silica). Both surfaces are acceptable, but different in appearance. Generally, angular particles work best when removing soft, pliable coatings, whereas shot or rounded particles are more effective in removing hard, brittle coatings (often aged) and mill scale. A mixture of both particle shapes is recommended for some jobs. Angular abrasives are generally used for coatings and rust removal; rounded sands are often used to remove mill scale from bare steel.

Density

Abrasive density can have a major impact on productivity. Generally, the higher the density, the better the productivity. Higher density particles impart more energy to the surface and, therefore, do more work. Application rate is the amount of abrasive required to achieve the level of cleanliness required. Generally, the denser the abrasive, the faster it will clean; thus, the denser abrasive will have a lower application rate compared to a less dense abrasive. As the mass or specific gravity of a particle increases, so does the amount of work being done by the particle. Therefore, if you change from a sand abrasive with a specific gravity of 2 to a

garnet abrasive with a specific gravity of 4, you should expect an increase in cleaning rate because the higher specific gravity particle will do more work. If all else is held constant (such as nozzle pressure and particle size), productivity will increase with the garnet.

Preliminary blast cleaning trials using several different abrasive products with different sizes usually can determine the most productive abrasive product for the

surface conditions. This is especially true for

your surface preparation costs.

As with fishing lures, most people already think they know their "best" abrasive because they have been using it for years. However, to be a true professional, you must be willing to experiment, change, and adapt to the surrounding conditions. Surface conditions have a major influence on the type, shape, size, density, and hardness of abrasives, and you must to be knowledgeable in the art to pick the best.

And don't forget: Abrasive blasting and abrasives are subject to regulations for environmental and worker protection. Regardless of the abrasive and cleaning method for a job, you must comply with all relevant regulations.

Experienced painting inspector Lee Wilson considers whether there should be wider adoption of the SSPC/NACE surface preparation standards.

t seems that every time I have a discussion with colleagues or attend an inspection course, we always end up talking about the finer details of surface preparation standards. In this article, I will give my perspectives on why surface preparation standards provoke constant discussion; describe differences between two well-known sets of such standards—those of ISO and those of SSPC/NACE; and give my views on more widely adopting the joint SSPC/NACE standards. Please be aware

that there are other standards; however, for this article I will touch upon some of the most widely used and specified standards.

Why So Much Talk about Surface Prep Standards?

Exactly why do we find surface preparation standards the most common discussion topic?

Well, like it or not, it is all about how clean the surface is before applying your protective coating. Some estimate that 60 to 85% of all premature failures can be

attributed directly to inadequate surface preparation, regardless of whether you are applying the latest and greatest protective coating. If you have not cleaned the substrate, you can expect premature failure of your protective coating or a reduced service life. Therefore, you can see the importance of surface preparation and the endless debates about it that can ensue.

During NACE coating inspection courses, for instance, students often ask why we have so many standards. The number of standards can lead to confusion over which are identical and which are equivalents. I have to agree: it really is quite confusing. I believe that SSPC and NACE are trying their very best to simplify it all, but let's face it—even the original authors of the standards got confused at various points.

For example, let's take a look at the original dry abrasive blasting standard, Swedish Standard SIS0055900. This standard was the first one developed for surface preparation. It depicted four rust grades and four blast standards. SIS0055900 was developed by the Swedish Corrosion Institute and showed four blasting standards Sa3, Sa2½, Sa2, and Sal. So why not 1,2,3 and 4, I hear you ask. Well, the Institute had Sa1, Sa2, and Sa3, then later found an in-between standard that was better than Sa2 but not as good as Sa3. So they called it Sa2½ to avoid confusion with the three standards already published. Thus, even at this stage, standards organizations were trying (I believe, however, unsuccessfully) to simplify it all. The Swedish standard was later superceded by International Standard ISO 8501-1, which is a slight extension.

Moreover, in the UK, we have BS7079 Part A1, which is ISO 8501-1 with a British Standard front cover. And we have standards such as DIN55928 that use the same photographs as

SIS0055900 and are in effect the same standard.

Now, far too many standards govern the same thing—surface preparation. So why didn't we just stick with the original SIS0055900 in the first place?

Since I now teach in NACE's coatings inspection program, I am more associated with, and in favor of, the joint SSPC/NACE blasting standards rather than the ISO 8501-1 standards. Why is this my position, you may ask, when the ISO standards are more frequently used throughout Europe, in fact, everywhere else on earth, except in the U.S. or where U.S. specifications are used. Well, I have to agree that our colleagues from across the Atlantic have got this one right.

Although two associations publish the SSPC/NACE standards, they have a joint name and are identical. SSPC-SP 5 is NACE No. 1; SSPC-SP 10 is NACE No. 2; SSPC-SP 6 is NACE No. 3, and so it goes. You get the picture: both organizations share the standard title, but the standard is the same. Once you grasp the concept of joint standards, you will see their additional benefits.

So why do I favor them? They simply make more sense. They give a more indepth look and a better description of the expected surface condition and how to achieve it. They elaborate with quantities and amounts, which has not been the case with other blast cleaning standards. The joint standards tell us what pre-cleaning is required and give us references to abrasive selection documents and solvent cleaning standards. They tell us what to do if the desired condition is lost and flash rusting begins. They also determine what to do with fabrication defects as well as a number of other points, which I am sure to have missed. (Although to be fair, other ISO standards in the 8501 series also cover these points.) All in all, in my opinion, the joint SSPC/NACE standards are far more comprehensive than the ISO dry abrasive blasting standards. In reality, the ISO standards tell us very little. Remember, the ISO standards are not identical to the joint SSPC/NACE standards, which are seen by industry as equivalents to their European counterparts.



So let us take a look at the current available working standards—both the joint standards for SSPC and NACE and their equivalents for ISO 8501.

Dry Abrasive Blasting Standards: A Comparison

Table 1 lists SSPC/NACE standards and their ISO equivalents. Key differences between some of the standards in Table 1 are discussed below in terms of their descriptions of surface cleanliness.

ISO 8501-1 Standard Sa2½

ISO 8501-1 Standard Sa $2\frac{1}{2}$, Very Thorough Blast Cleaning, states:

"When viewed without magnification, the surface shall be free from visible oil, grease and dirt, and from mill scale, rust, paint coatings and foreign matter. Any remaining traces of contamination shall show only as slight stains in the form of spots or stripes."

That's all, folks—just a sentence with an enigmatic phrase: "...slight stains in the form of spots or stripes." Can someone please tell me what that's all about? The debates over the above definition of this standard have been ongoing for decades, as you are well aware, and the contractor, the client, and the manufacturer all have different

interpretations of "slight."

• What are these "slight" stains?

I have had all the usual answers to this question about stains, such as "they're mill scale"; "they're rust"; "they're old coating." But my answer is always the same. The standard, states that the blast-cleaned surface shall be free visually of all of the above-mentioned contamination. If a stain is visible, then it is in contra-

diction of the standard, and that's exactly what the standard does: it contradicts itself and doesn't offer a solution or a get-out-of-jail-free card. The standard simply causes confusion for inspectors and supervisors unlucky enough to fall into a debate over the definition of "slight" and of "slight stains."

• I chose $Sa2^{1/2}$ as an example for the simple reason that it is the most widely used dry abrasive blasting standard in our industry, yet many now believe that it is seriously in need of a revamp...but then again, is it?

I don't think Sa $2\frac{1}{2}$ needs a revamp because it would only confuse the already confused, including me. I believe that we have salvation in the shape of the joint SSPC/NACE standards.


For example, let's take a look at the SSPC-SP 10/NACE No. 2, "Near-White Metal," standard, the equivalent to the ISO 8501-1 Standard Sa $2\frac{1}{2}$.

• What is the difference, and what more do we get from the joint SSPC/NACE standards?

Let me start with the definition—that's where the fun really begins. This is the heart of the standard and the section in which the standard is remembered.

SSPC-SP 10/NACE No. 2

SSPC-SP 10/NACE No. 2, Near White Metal, states:



SSPC-SP 10/NACE No. 2 or Sa21/2?

"A near-white metal blast cleaned surface, when viewed without magnification, shall be free of all visible oil, grease, dust, dirt, mill scale, rust, coating, oxides, corrosion products, and other foreign matter. Random staining shall be limited to no more than 5 percent of each unit area of surface (approximately $5,800~\text{mm}^2$ [9.0 in.²] (i.e., a square 76 mm x 76 mm [3.0 in x 3.0 in.]), and may consist of light shadows, slight streaks, or minor discolorations caused by stains of rust, stains of mill scale, or stains of previously applied coating."

Here is my point: The joint standard tells me what stains are allowed (light shadows and slight streaks or minor discolorations caused by stains of rust, mill scale, or previously applied coating), and it tells me the amount of such staining allowed on the surface after blast cleaning. I now know that I am allowed 5% of visible contamination and in what form, much more information than is given in ISO 8501-1.

• What else does the SSPC/NACE standard tell me?

It gives me clear instructions that no oil, grease, or dirt is allowed on the substrate, and it tells me how to remove the contamination—by following SSPC-SP 1, "Solvent Cleaning."

However, even SSPC-SP 10/NACE No. 2 isn't perfect. SSPC-SP 1 advocates solvent cleaning, and cleaning with most solvents is not an environmentally friendly or operator friendly procedure. SP 1 does give the option of emulsion/alkaline cleaning or steam/hot water/detergent cleaning. These methods can leave residues as potentially harmful as oil, grease, or dirt on a metal surface unless an adequate freshwater cleaning (not an option in a lot of cases) follows.

The joint standard also gives a full rundown of the requirements for the written standard, including

- general information regarding the standard;
- definition or the heart of the standard;
- reference documents such as SSPC-SP 1 and SSPC-VIS 1 (Pictorial standard, described below) as well as abrasive (AB) standards and SSPC-PA Guide 3, on safety in paint application;
- · procedure before blasting;
- · blast cleaning methods;
- blast cleaning abrasives
- · procedure following blast cleaning immediately before coating;
- inspection;
- · safety and environmental conditions; and
- · comments.

From SSPC-SP 10/NACE No. 2, I get five pages of information telling me what to do and in what order to do it to comply with the requirements of the standard—five pages of information as opposed to ISO 8501-1's one sentence, which does little more than confuse me and my fellow inspectors.

In addition to the five-page written joint standard, I get a reference to SSPC-VIS 1, "Guide and Reference Photographs,

Steel Surfaces Prepared by Dry Abrasive Blasting." Similar to ISO 8501-1, SSPC-VIS 1 shows the rust grades (five in the SSPC standard) blasted to all the SSPC / NACE joint standards. It also informs me of acceptable variations in appearance—factors such as the original surface condition or the type of abrasive used that may affect the visual

appearance of the standard but not the actual surface cleanliness.

The joint standards thus come with copious amounts of information, directions, and a visual supplement from SSPC, so I ask: Why, when all this information is available to us, are specifiers still choosing the ISO 8501-1 standards for dry abrasive blasting

without stating the SSPC/NACE standards as equivalent standards?

Closing Thoughts

I am not saying that the current typical European practice is wrong. The ISO standards have been referenced for many years, and they have, in part, worked. And in the interests of full disclosure, I have worked on two recent major European projects that referenced the ISO 8501-1 dry abrasive blasting standards. However, more than 25,000 NACE-certified inspectors across the globe are well versed in the joint SSPC/NACE standards, and I think we should use the training to its full advantage.

In defense of ISO 8501-1, I should stress that the standard is a pictorial one, and you are meant to compare the standard photographs with the surface you are preparing. As a pictorial standard, it also has the advantage of not relying on the English language to be able to use it. This advantange is important for projects around the world where English is not spoken or understood by the operator—a situation that does not generally exist in the U.S.

Unfortunately, while the limited text in ISO 8501-1 is supposed to be an aid to the photographs, the brevity of the description also can cause problems with using the standard correctly.

There is obviously a trend in using international standards, with most countries abandoning their own standards and opting for ISO to simplify the specifying process. Long may this trend toward a single standard continue. However, in conclusion, I think specifiers across Europe should start looking at the SSPC/NACE joint standards more carefully. I believe that their use might be the way forward in perfecting the standards used by the industry. Alternatively, maybe there is a happy medium, that of using and incorporating the SSPC/NACE descriptions for the ISO standards, but I will leave such decisions to the standards committees.

The SSPC Coatings Education Award is given each year for significant developments in the dissemination of educational and technical information relating to protective coatings and their application.




allowed him to give an insight to the students that many other individuals may not have been able to give," Shoup said.



SSPC Annual Report (January 1, 2010 to December 31, 2010)

Part I: Introduction

This annual report gives an overview of the activities, plans, and status of SSPC: The Society for Protective Coatings from January 1, 2010, through December 31, 2010. The information enclosed gives the most current figures for all programs.

SSPC had another successful year.

The sixth annual PACE conference (February 2010), the launching of many new training programs, and continued progress on the strategic marketing plan were the highlights for SSPC in calendar year 2010.

We continue to look at foreign markets as a way to expand SSPC and the message we are trying to deliver, which is that the use of protective coatings is the best solution to corro-

sion control. With that, we continue to explore potential international markets.

Marketing efforts continue to focus on core SSPC member demographics that are spread across a broad range of industries. Key member demographics include painting contractors; facility owners; consultants; inspectors; engineers; and coatings, materials, and equipment manufacturers and suppliers. Targeted industries include water/wastewater, transportation, power, marine, defense, and chem/petrochem.

Part II: Achieving SSPC's Vision

We continue to progress in implementing our present marketing plan to achieve the Society's vision. That vision is: "SSPC will be the worldwide

acknowledged resource and authority for protective coatings technology and information."

A major accomplishment in 2010 was the fact that the Florida Board of Engineers approved the SSPC Conference education program for CEUs. Professional engineers with two Florida licenses who register for the full

conference can receive 15 CEUs toward their license renewals.

As of October 2010, the Bureau of Veteran Affairs approved veterans receiving a reimbursement of up to \$550 for SSPC Training/Certification Exams.

Also, in the area of Public Policy Advocacy, SSPC submitted comments to EPA on the proposed Coal Combustion Residual Rule and the Information Collection Request Requirements for Reporting Emissions Due to Paint Stripping Rule.

SSPC also posted headlines on our website relating to government activi-

ties that may affect the coatings industry.

In the area of providing information, we had 1,039 technical information inquiries in 2010. This is down from 1,102 in 2009, or 5.7%. We remain a superb resource of information for our members and the industry, and we invite you to make use of the staff capability we have.

SSPC is a member-based

organization. We are evaluated on how well our programs and services meet the needs of our members and the protective coatings industry.

standards completed in FY 2010 are listed in Table 1.

Certification

The past year saw an increase in the total number of certified contractors. Two hundred ninety-one contractors, many holding multiple certifications, have achieved certification, an increase of 6.6% over 2009. The past year also saw an increase in the total number of certified coating and lining inspection entities. Seven companies have achieved Coating and Lining Inspection Company certification, an increase of 250% over 2009. In the Protective Coatings Specialists Certification (PCS) program, we have 252 participants certified, an increase of 7.7% from last year. A breakdown of the certification programs is shown in Figure 1.

Training

*In brackets is the percentage increase or decrease from last year.

The PCS program, along with other SSPC programs that accept the SSPC C-1, Fundamentals of Protective Coatings, and the C-2, Specifying and Managing Coatings Projects, as part of their prerequisites for education, has continued to spur an interest in these courses with 181 [-38%] students trained this year. The number of students taking advantage of the value of our online course offerings has increased to 162 [+54%] this year. For Lead Supervisor Competent Person Training (C-3 and C-5), 1,661 [+7.1%] students received training. Another 86 students participated in our Lead Worker training program. The C-7, Abrasive Blasting, course had 445 [+33.7%] personnel trained. Airless Spray (C-12) had 193 [+212%] students trained; Water Jetting (C-13) had 34 [-29%]; and Marine Plural Component (C-14) had 124 [-20%]. The Applicator Train-the-Trainer course had 28 [-6.6%] students. The Quality Control Supervisor course (QCS) had 99 students trained, with another 211 [+93%] taking the course on-line. We




Fig. 2: Individual Membership Demographics

newly revised Concrete Coating Inspector Program; 415 [-12.7%] students in the NAVSEA Basic Paint Inspector (NBPI) program; 58 [-48%] in the Bridge Coating Inspector Program; and 270 [-27%] students completed the Protective Coating Inspector (PCI) Program.

Webinars

SSPC began offering free webinars in 2010. The webinars are presented once a month. This year's offerings were very successful with 1,498 attendees. SSPC also offers a short online webinar exam that provides Recertification Units toward the

Protective Coating Specialist (PCS) certification renewal.



International Training

SSPC continues to expand its training and certification offerings around the world. We held the NAVSEA Basic Paint Inspector (NBPI) course for the U.S. Navy Command Logistics Group, Western Pacific, in Singapore and for the detachment of Norfolk Ship Support Activity (NSSA) in Bahrain.

Our China Chapter and licensee remain active with the SSPC-C holding two C-2 classes in Shanghai and our licensee in China, Moody International, holding the Protective Coating Inspector (PCI) certification program four times.

The SSPC Philippines Chapter continues to grow. The chapter held their second seminar in June in the Makati City. The Role of Protective Coatings in Corrosion Control II was held several weeks before the chapter held their first Applicator Train-the-Trainer (ATT) Program for 15 students. The chapter also held two PCI classes this year.

Website

SSPC's goal is to enhance and maintain SSPC Online for the benefit of its members. We continue to offer the popular Tech Features (excerpts from SSPC publications), "Ask SSPC" questions and answers, downloadable standards on SSPC's MarketPlace, regulatory news as it happens, SSPC certification, PCCP and PCS news, and up-to-date information on SSPC training.

We continue to offer Featured Links on the homepage for the American Association of State Highway and Transportation officials, "data mines" where individuals from transportation agencies can readily find coatings information. We have enhanced the system, enabling members to set their own password and user ID and fill out individual profile information.

Many of the online forms offered by SSPC have been revised to accommodate newer Internet capabilities, and several of the forms are now offered in

downloadable PDF format.

We also added an Onsite Training request form to enable individuals to bring SSPC training courses to their own facilities. New forms for PCS, NBPI, and PCCP have been added for member convenience. We've also updated the online Tools and Links section, and email groups targeting specific market interests.

The average number of unique visitors to our site is 17,735 per month, an increase from last year by 13.4%.

Part IV: Membership and Administration

Membership

During the reporting period, SSPC organizational membership (OM) increased to 792, or 5.2%. Individual membership grew from 8,437 in December 2009 to 8,768 in December 2010, an increase of 3.9%. A breakdown of individual members' demographics is shown in Figure 2; however, it remains nearly the same as the previous year.

We are pleased with the progress in increased organizational and individual membership in these tough economic times. However, we cannot remain satisfied with the status-quo.

Governance

The Board of Governors changed in 2010. The Board welcomed Mr. Gunnar Ackx from SCICON Worldwide byba, our international representative, and Mr. L. Skip Vernon from CLT, Inc. Both individuals represent the Other Service Provider demographic. The present Board is shown in Table 2.

Administration

Key staff members remained the same. They are: Bill Shoup, Executive Director; Michael Damiano, Director of Product Development; Barbara Fisher, Controller; Mike Kline, Director of Marketing; and Terry Sowers, Director of Member Services.

Part U: Finances

We are pleased to report that SSPC, again, met its financial goals for the FY, which ended December 31, 2010. The reserve fund now stands at \$3,162,000, which represents about 51% of the average annual operating revenue. SSPC has met its financial goals by increasing revenue by \$42,000, while decreasing expenses by 5%. The finan-



Exceletech Wins Treatment Plant Painting Project

xceletech Coating & Applications, LLC (Clermont, FL) was awarded a contract of \$399,950 by the Clay County Utility Authority (Middleburg, FL) to coat steel structures at six water treatment plants and two wastewater treatment

The contract involves abrasive blast cleaning and lining interior surfaces with an epoxy system and pressure-washing and coating exterior surfaces with an epoxy-polyurethane system. The project includes coating ground storage tanks, hydro tanks, a surge basin, secondary clarifiers, aeration basins, and interior building surfaces.

The New York State Thruway Authority awarded a contract of \$8,866,500 to P.S. Bruckel, Inc. (Avon, NY) to recoat 13 bridges in the Albany region. The steel will be abrasive blast-cleaned to a Near-White finish (SSPC-SP 10) and coated with a 3-coat, organic zinc-rich system. The existing coatings may contain lead, necessitating Class A containment according to New York State standards. The contract required SSPC-QP 1 and QP 2 certification.

West Virginia DOT Lets Bridge Painting Bid

The West Virginia Department of Transportation awarded a contract of \$591,887.50 to Tarpon Industrial, Inc. (Tarpon Springs, FL), SSPC-QP 1- and QP 2-certified, to recoat the Big Sandy Creek Bridge in Roane County. The bridge consists of dual structures with lengths of 373 and 376 feet. A total of approximately 502 tons of structural steel will be abrasive blast-cleaned to a Near-White finish (SSPC-SP 10) and coated with an organic zinc-rich primer and two coats of waterborne acrylic finish. The contract includes containing the existing lead-bearing coatings within a Class 2A containment structure (SSPC-Guide 6).

Energy Northwest Lets Power Plant Job

Curran International Corp. (Dickinson, TX) secured a contract of \$195,000 from Energy Northwest to shop-coat the interior surfaces of inlet and outlet replacement water boxes used in the main condenser at the Columbia Generating Station. The Columbia Generating Station is a 1,150-megawatt boiling water reactor power plant outside of Richland, WA. The facility is the only commercially-operated nuclear power plant in the Northwest.

Era Valdivia Wins Elevated Tank Painting Job

Era Valdivia Contractors, Inc. (Chicago, IL), SSPC-QP 1- and QP 2-certified, was awarded a contract of \$1,050,000 from the city of Milwaukee, WI, to recoat a 2 MG elevated water storage tank. The interior surfaces will be abrasive blast-

cleaned to a Near-White finish (SSPC-SP 10) and lined with a zinc-epoxy system on wet surfaces and an epoxy system on dry surfaces. The exterior will be abrasive blast-cleaned to a Commercial finish (SSPC-SP 6) and coated with an acrylic polymer system. The contract requires the use of containment and ventilation.

JETCO Secures Water Tower Contract

The Village of Morton Grove, IL, awarded a contract of \$168,500 to JETCO Ltd (Prospect Heights, IL) to abrasive blast clean and recoat the interior and exterior surfaces of a 300,000-gallon elevated water storage tank. The project includes coating exterior steel with a 3-coat epoxy-urethane system, lining interior wet surfaces with a 3-coat zinc-epoxy system, coating interior dry surfaces with a 2-coat epoxy system, sealing concrete foundation surfaces with a 2-coat epoxy system, and overcoating pit piping.

Town Hall Painting Wins DAF Tank Lining Job

Town Hall Painting (Virginia Beach, VA) was awarded a contract of \$12,750 by its local sanitary authority, the Hampton Roads Sanitation District, to line the interior surfaces of a DAF tank at the Boat Harbor Treatment Plant. The

dissolved air flotation tank will be spot abrasive blast-cleaned to a Commercial finish (SSPC-SP 6) and lined with an amine epoxy system.

New Kent Coatings Wins Tank Painting Project

New Kent Coatings, Inc. (Providence Forge, VA) was awarded a contract of \$47,608 by the city of Lynchburg, VA, to perform coatings application and miscellaneous repairs on the 1.4 MG College Hill Water Tank. The project includes overcoating the exterior steel and sealing the concrete foundation. The steel will be pressure-washed at 5,000-10,000 psi; spot-power-tool cleaned to Bare Metal (SSPC-SP 11); and overcoated with a 3-coat epoxy-urethane system. The concrete will be pressure-washed and coated with a waterborne acrylic sealant.

Uirginia DOT Awards Three Bridge Painting Projects

The Virginia Department of Transportation recently awarded three contracts for bridge painting. All three contracts include containment and disposal of hazardous waste, as well as application of paint system B according to state standards.

U.S. Coast Guard Awards Drydocking Contract

The United States Coast Guard, Maintenance and Logistics Command,

Atlantic, awarded a contract of \$169,046.50 to Master Marine, Inc. (Bayou La Batre, LA) to perform drydocking

The DOT awarded a contract of \$1,875,000 to Saffo Contractors (Wilmington, NC), SSPC-QP 1- and QP 2-certified, to recoat approximately 1,534 tons of structural steel on a bridge over the Rappahannock River in Stafford County. The DOT awarded two contracts to Amstar of Western New York (Cheektowaga, NY), SSPC-QP 1- and QP 2-certified: a \$1,020,000 agreement for coating a total of 856 tons of structural steel on nine bridges in the Lynchburg district and a contract of

\$812,000 for coating a total of 722 tons of structural steel on three bridges in Culpeper County.

Arkansas HTD Lets Bridge Painting Projects

The Arkansas Highway and Transportation Department recently awarded two bridge painting projects that were advertised in the February 23, 2011 letting. The contracts, which required SSPC-QP 1 and QP 2 certification, include removing and containing existing lead-bearing coatings and applying new inorganic zinc-epoxypolyurethane systems.

\$666,666 by the city of Shoreview, MN, to rehabilitate a 1.5 MG hydropillarstyle elevated water tank. The contract includes coatings application on exterior, interior dry, and interior wet surfaces. The exterior and interior dry surfaces will be abrasive blast-cleaned to a Near-White finish (SSPC-SP 10), followed by zinc-epoxy-urethane system application on the exterior and zincepoxy liner application on the interior dry. The interior wet surfaces, which were applied in 2007, will be cleaned and spot-coated with epoxy. The contract includes containment of lead-bearing coatings on the interior dry surfaces.

Caltrans Awards Overpass Painting Bid

The California Department Transportation awarded a contract of \$828,750 to Murphy Industrial Coatings, Inc. (Signal Hill, CA) to recoat 266-foot-long overcrossing Alhambra, Los Angeles County. A dozen ideas to keep your business healthy, even in the tough times.

he economy has taken an unprecedented turn in the last couple of years. Recovery has been the subject of great debate among financial planners and economists in recent months, with most of them shrugging their shoulders. As industries wrestle with this environment. our businesses face some uncomfortable dilemmas. Companies involved with protective coatings work, from manufacturers and facility owners to contractors and consultants, face the same dilemmas as other businesses. Should we shrink with the economy, just hold on until it comes back, or figure out how to overcome the situation? Regardless of what your strategy is to survive the cur-

rent state of things, there are some tactics and behaviors that you can use to help you succeed.

This article suggests 12 ways to help your organization weather the season and be stronger when the economy improves.

Ideas for Your Strategy for Success

1. Retain focus on the customer.

Organizations often turn inward to solve their problems, ignoring their lifeline. The last thing you want is to lose customers, particularly in a tough economy that makes them even harder to replace.

2. Simplify things. What programs are critical to performance and which ones can be streamlined. For example,

organizations often allow their incentive program to get so complex that management cannot determine the real impact. The intent of such programs is to motivate and reward each employee by tying an incentive to every responsibility that the individual has. The program can backfire, especially in a weak economy. If sales were good, but receivables were not, everyone loses. If profitability was satisfactory, but growth was slow, everyone loses. Not only do these programs consume huge amounts of management's energy, but also, they create mistrust and apathy among employees. Take a close look at each process and procedure to see if it is necessary, could be performed by someone else, could be automated, or could be streamlined. The outcome will be higher productivity, morale and profit.

3. Motivate your workforce and your sales force. These are scary times for us all. Your valued employees are watching closely to see if they are next. All they want is honesty. They know there are no promises. If they know they can trust their employer to do whatever is possible to save their jobs, they will do the same. There is no stronger motivator than to know that you are a part of the effort, that your contribution is significant. Nobody expects big raises. The people you want on your team are the ones that want to ride it out with you. Make them feel like their efforts mean something.

4. Of course, control costs. Monitor, but don't micro-manage. What you want is a culture of responsibility, not one that has the staff hiding and keeping their heads down. Most companies can find significant waste in their operations, and who better to find it than those wasting? Get ideas from your team, accept the

good ones, and hold the team accountable to engage the ideas accepted. Set boundaries and milestones. Follow through so the team knows you are serious.

Be very careful cutting costs that support quality, response, or securing new business. These are the easiest to cut, but can also be the most painful. You can't harbor sacred cows. Decide what is not critical to the operation and target these things for elimination or postponement.

5. Co-market. It is possible to multiply your touch points for half the price. A few years ago, some of us got together and produced a one-day technical symposium. The value of this undertaking went way beyond the obvious exposure we enjoyed by assembling a room of captive customers. By assembling the right team of presenters, we all contributed to each other's credibility. Other co-sponsoring ideas include sponsorships at industry events, sharing hot links on your websites, and simply going on joint calls with vendors.

6. Network. This is a practice that gets a lot of buzz in the sales and marketing world. As a manager, you can also learn from others in your industry or from peers in business. A great deal of what is gained from trade associations is a sharing of ideas. Someone out there has a better idea than yours. Someone

had a problem like yours and solved it.

There are synergies that you will never discover if you don't talk to people. Many of these events are in the evenings and outside of the normal workday. The achievers are at these events—so how about you? Do you want to mingle with the achievers? It is also as simple as speaking to the person next to you on the plane or in the elevator. Huge opportunities have come to me in these spontaneous conversations.

Encourage your team to connect with someone and report back with the results. The first contact I made in Alaska was Charlie Grimm. He was a master at networking on the phone. I would be speaking to him about a new product or application, and next thing I knew he had me on a three-way call with someone he knew that might use the idea. Boom, just like that—I was connected.

7. Align vendors with your vision.

Do you believe that your customers value service over price? Then why would you focus on price with your vendors? The concept of just-in-time inventory is a good example of asking vendors to align with your strategy. Can they adjust their inventory, packaging size, shape, or color to complement your product or service? As you evaluate the different aspects of your offering, also consider how your vendors can help you add value.

8. Use incentives for performance.

One of the most powerful motivators I have seen was a silly trophy that was earned month-by-month by the top salesman in an area. It was coveted and displayed proudly. So choose the incentive rewards carefully. Although it is widely accepted that short-term incentives are valuable, monetary incentives can be very tricky.

Someone will almost always try to derail the program, claiming that it is unfair even though it could put money in his or her pocket. People can also begin to expect rewards all the time. Be careful not to reward people for doing their job, but for doing their job well. Incentives should be challenging but achievable. Maybe, in these times when any profit is considered a success, the team should be rewarded for small victories.

One three-month program offered a menu of prizes for exceptional performance in various areas of the business. Everyone could contribute, everyone could earn a prize, and there were some grand prizes. And the success of the program came through heavy promotion. This included posters, a theme, conference calls, and published monthly scorecards. The objective of any incentive should be to place additional focus on a specific activity, practice or goal while promoting enthusiasm and a feeling of belonging.

9. Focus on strengths. We often focus our efforts on the weaknesses in our organization. In reality, the best that can be expected from this approach is to correct damaging behaviors and affect mediocre performance in the weak areas. By working to develop strengths, we can see huge improvements in performance as people develop in areas where they are comfortable, capable, and confident. Spend some time discussing and determining what each person is good at. You may be

surprised at the opportunities you uncover.

What many managers fail to do is to quickly reward the right activity or behavior. This is the simplest and easiest way to focus on someone's strength. On a series of monthly conference calls, I asked each manager to share how they had rewarded someone on their team for a job well done. My thought was that they would eventually begin thinking about this a little more. I learned that this simple practice is really very rare, and many managers have difficulty handing out compliments.

10. Don't fire poor performanceupgrade. It is said that no one should be surprised when they are fired. The effective leader has given a subordinate all the coaching, training, and guidance needed to succeed. If success is not then achieved, it must be from a lack of either desire or ability. Both desire and ability can be improved, but not always, and at what cost? The effective leader also communicates expectations and progress made. I have seen people who were struggling in their position be reassigned to positions that better suited their strengths and then watched them blossom.

The real mistake in today's climate, is to allow someone to continue to fail. If the employee does not have the desire or the capability, you will do both of you a favor by taking action. What is difficult to watch is when a manager watches the failure unfold and does not look for a replacement. It is very painful to have a position vacant while you recruit. In reality, we should always be looking for that talented replacement that will take the company to the next level. All staff, including you, should know that they must continue to perform and improve or someone else will. That's life in the jungle.

11. Invest more of your own time.
You want everyone else to step up, so

what about you? Let them see the intensity. Let them see you coming in early and leaving late. How can you expect them to go the extra mile if you don't? An additional side benefit, beyond a healthy example, is the value you get from a better understanding of what's going on in the field.

12. Execute. Commit to the plan with the group. Make it visible. As in 12-step programs, you strengthen your commitment by sharing it with others. Let your organization know what the plan is, how you will measure performance in the plan, and what the consequences will be. Then, like raising children, you must be consistent. Employees also develop habits and practice restraint only when they have experienced the continuous commitment to the process by their leaders. One manager stated "What gets measured gets done." Another said "You can't expect what you don't inspect". Oh, and be sure you live by the same rules.

Now What?

Pick two or three of the 12 ideas above, figure out how you can implement them, and give them a try. Make sure number 12 is one of them.

Is it not true that the ideas above are the same tactics you would use in a good economy? In my experience, tough times force us to accomplish what we should have been doing all along. This should be no surprise. If we are effective at executing our strategy in the good times, should we change our strategy during the tough times or just do a better job of accomplishing what we set out to do? It seems logical that, if conceived and planned properly, the strategy may still be effective in the bad economy. It just becomes more critical to execute and execute well.

To illustrate, let's consider a customercentered strategy. Should you abandon such a strategy only because your overhead may not support all of the planned components? If you identified a strong strategy where you want to command a particular market or product type, why should the strategy and positioning be less important or irrelevant in a recession? Is maintaining a leadership position valuable only in a good economy?

You Might Need a New Strategy With all of this being said, it still may be wise to contrive a new strategy. People think of things every day that launch them into financial success, even in the worst of times. Jonathon Swift once wrote. "Necessity is the mother of invention." My grandfather had the good sense to go to auctioneer school during the great depression. He sold farm auctions and came out of the worst financial crisis in history with enough cash in his pocket to start a new business...a stateof-the-art livestock auction market. It was a solid idea, and the business is still flourishing.

Often, managers focus their creativity on cutting costs and resources as the only way to improve the p&I (profit and loss) when sales are down. They think, "We must re-size the organization to match the revenue." Or "How can we reduce payroll without losing sales or productivity?" The company may survive the downturn, but is it the same company? When the economy turns around, are you ready to accelerate to peak performance or are you reeling from the contraction? Are you suffering from poor morale and operating with a fraction of the good talent that helped you build the organization in the first place?

Some Closing Thoughts

Most companies' personnel are their most valuable resource. My guess is that you cannot operate without employees or customers, and you cannot have happy customers without happy employees. A capable, motivated workforce is a powerful and crucial component in any strategy to survive an economic downturn. Even the best of plans will fail if the organization is not motivated to execute the plan. It is also true that a mediocre plan can achieve great results with a motivated team that will adapt to

changes and overcome obstacles. As you battle to pull your company through tough times, remember what got you where you are and what is needed for continued success. Most likely, it will be critical to preserve some basic qualities, practices, and behaviors. JPCL
